Eglwysi rhyddion Cymru yn pryderu am drafodaeth Brexit

Mae Cyngor Eglwysi Rhyddion Cymru wedi mynegi pryder am dôn y drafodaeth gyhoeddus am sut a phryd y bydd y Deyrnas Unedig yn ymadael â'r Undeb Ewropeaidd.

Wrth gyfarfod yng Nghaerdydd ar Dachwedd 17, fe fynegodd cynrychiolwyr y prif enwadau Anghydfurfiol yng Nghymru eu gofid bod sylwadau trahaus ac amhriodol yn cael eu gwneud am bobl o genhedloedd eraill ac am ferched yn benodol, a hynny weithiau gan wleidyddion blaenllaw yn y Deyrnas Unedig.

Meddai Llywydd y Cyngor, y Parch. Peter Dewi Richards, "Roedd y cynrychiolwyr yn ofidus iawn fod gwleidyddion blaenllaw, ddylai fod yn dangos arweiniad yn y materion hyn, yn lle hynny wedi manteisio ar awyrgylch cyhoeddus gwenwynig i wneud sylwadau cywilyddus am bobl o wledydd eraill. Rydym fel Cyngor yn credu y dylai parch at bobl o bob tras, hil a chenedl fod yn ganolog i'n sgysiau cyhoeddus, ac nad yw canlyniad y refferendwm – na chanlyniad etholiad Arlywyddol yr Unol Daleithiau – yn newid dim ar yr egwyddor Gristnogol honno."

Cytunodd y Cyngor hefyd i ategu ymatebion Gweithgor yr Eglwysi am Gymru ac Ewrop i ymgynghoriadau Pwyllgor Materion Cymreig Tŷ'r Cyffredin a Chyd-Bwyllgor Senedd San Steffan ar lawnderau Dynol i'w hymgyngoriadau diweddar am y trafodaethau i ymadael â'r Undeb Ewropeaidd. Mae'r ymatebion hyn yn pwysleisio na ddylai'r newidiadau hyn effeithio ar ein hymrwymiad fel gwledydd Prydain i iawnderau dynol a thegwch i bawb, ac na allant ein tynnu o'n perthynas â'n cyd-Gristnogion a phobl o bob ffydd a dim ffydd ar draws cyfandir Ewrop, y cyfandir yr ydym o hyd yn rhan ohono.

Wales' free churches concern about tone of Brexit debate

The Free Church Council for Wales has expressed its concern at the tone of the public debate on how and when the United Kingdom will leave the European Union. Meeting in Cardiff on November 17, representatives of the main Nonconformist Christian churches in Wales said they were worried that some leading UK politicians were making aggressive and inappropriate comments about people from other nations and about women.

The Moderator of the Council, Revd Peter Dewi Richards, said "The representatives were deeply concerned that well-known politicians, who should be setting an example in this regard, were instead taking advantage of a poisonous public atmosphere to make offensive comments about people from other countries. As a Free Church Council, we believe that respect for people of all races, nations and cultures should be pivotal to our public debates, and that this Christian principle is not altered in any way by the result of the referendum – nor by the result of the Presidential election in the United States."

The Council also agreed to support the responses of the Churches' Working Party on Wales and Europe to the consultations carried out by the Welsh Affairs Committee of the House of Commons and the Joint Committee on Human Rights of both Houses of Parliament. These responses emphasize that the change in the UK's membership of the EU should not affect in any way the commitment of the nations of the UK to human rights and fair treatment for all people, and that the new situation cannot affect our relationship with our fellow Christians and people of all faiths and none on the European continent, of which we remain part.

Notes for editors

The Free Church Council for Wales includes representatives of the Union of Welsh Independents, the Baptist Union of Wales, the Presbyterian Church of Wales, the United Reformed Church in Wales, the Congregational Federation in Wales, the Methodist Church in Wales and the Salvation Army in Wales. In total, these denominations have about 65,000 adult members in 1,600 churches throughout Wales, worshipping in Welsh and English.
