BIRD BOX: What you need:

1 board 152mm x 19mm (not planed), approximately 1450mm long

24 oval 38mm nails

2 brass hooks and eyes

several copper tacks

strip of rubber/waterproof canvas/leather 150mmx50mm

saw, hammer, brace and 28mm bit

What you do:

Cut the wood as shown in the diagram.


One diagonal cut will form the slopes of the two sides.

Make an entrance hole in the piece that will form the front of the box 28mm in diameter and about 25mm from the top to attract Blue Tits and Great Tits.

Make a box using nails. It should be a box shape with a slanted roof.

Hinge the roof with a piece of rubber, waterproof canvas, or leather, and attach the hooks and eyes to secure the box. This will help you to clean the box out in autumn ready for the spring.

Position the box high up on a tree or wall so that predators cannot get to it.



Bat Box: What you do:

Bat boxes must always be made of untreated wood. Use the same measurements as described for the bird box.

Bats need holes in the bottom, towards the back of the box about 12mm wide.

On the inside of the box on the back wall, make grooves with a saw. These should be about 3mm deep and 9mm apart. These enable the bats to hang in the box.

Site the box high up a on a tree, with no branches near it so the bats have easy access.

Paints or preservatives must never be used on the box as they can harm or kill a bat.

Bats like different temperatures at different times. So, it is best to make two or three boxes and position them around a tree. This means in colder weather they can generate more heat.



Bats (and their living quarters) are protected by law. You must not harm them or destroy where they live. If you need to move them for any reason, you need to get a licence from the Countryside Council for Wales or contact your local bat group to find a licensed member who might be able to help you.
